

Going on Holiday

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Get your pet microchipped

Microchipping is easy, quick, and doesn't cost much, but invaluable if your pet strays, especially on unknown territory!

Vet Visit

Check that all necessary shots or vaccinations are up to date with the required paperwork, especially rabies certificate, and where applicable, were administered within a specified date range before travel.



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Medication

Make sure to bring all prescribed medication.

Bring familiar Toys, Bed, etc

Pack their favorite Toys, Bed/Blanket, Food & Treats, and Water and Water Dishes. Dogs need routines—keeping things as familiar as possible helps take the stress out of traveling.



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Bring him/her for a walk first

Dogs can be restless when traveling. Take him/her for a long walk first to use up excess energy, especially before starting a long car journey.

Flying?

Make sure he or she is used to his/her cage. Do some reward-based training first, it will pay off—for you and your dog!



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Travelling within the EU? Get an EU Pet Passport!

Avoid quarantine: if traveling with your pet within the EU, accompanied by an up-to-date EU Pet Passport, there is no requirement for quarantine.

Pet Travel Accessories

Secure collar with current ID tags, Leash, and Harness. Ensure you have all the necessary pet travel accessories for identification and safety



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Photo of your pet

Make sure you have a photo of your pet on your phone, just in case!

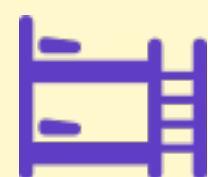
Pet First Aid Kit

Gauze, Scissors, Tape, Antibiotic Ointment, Cotton Balls/Swabs, Tweezer, Hydrogen Peroxide: If your dog does ingest something toxic, you may have to induce vomiting.
